Baptiste-Lacasse	 Teacher's Report: Grade 3 team a) Some highlights of what Gr 3 students are learning: b to write cursive physical literacy b to celebrate different cultures (through social studies learning) classroom economy - each student has classroom coins that they can earn by doing things in class (like helping others, tidying up, etc.) and exchange them for 				

 classroom supplies. outdoor classroom - learning while walking outside as class. sharing circle, thinking class - students collaborating together to solve problems (math, science, etc.)students have access to a lot of different tools and strategies, to learn how they best learn and regulate. self regulation - zones of regulation - blue zone, green zone, yellow zone, red zone. 2. Parent Wellness: Conflict Management a) Recently, Ecole Edwards has changed some language: from "supervision" to "coaching". b) Conflict is a normal part of human interaction. Feelings are the first signs of a problem, but they aren the problem. Work through the feelings get to the root of the problem . Coaching is working through the feeling, identifying the problem, then problem solving
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 c) Working through the feeling is difficult, but necessary. It important that kids learn to be sad, disappointment, angry, etc. d) Practice makes perfect - effective communication is a skill. e) Parents, teachers and trusted adults need to model desired behaviour, how we want to see our students work through conflict. f) The coaches at school are in there with the students, active, talking, and watching for things to teach - they are active, engaged problem solvers. g) STOP - MAKE SPACE - ASSESS - PROBLEM SOLVE you don't have to know all the answers right away.
