School Trustee, (Melissa Bowen )	<ol> <li>Staff from Ecole Edwards went to the RVS board of Trustees meeting, to share how Positive Behaviour Intervention Strategies are being used to create a positive, welcoming culture at our school.</li> <li>Balancing Airdrie Student Spaces: - see email or link for full report         <ul> <li>a) over 1300 surveys were completed, and 500 people attended the in person open houses;</li> <li>b) funding increased 2.7 % - to cover enrollment cost;</li> <li>c) expenditures are lower than projected right now, but there is still time left in the school year. If there is surplus, it can go to reserves.</li> <li>d) no changes happen until September 2025;</li> <li>e) Ecole Edwards will become grades K-6 and some communities will be re-designated into Edwards.</li> <li>f) Transportation has been for rural transport</li> <li>g) school fee numbers have been approved</li> </ul> </li> </ol>			

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- Ecole Edwards is projected to be at 97% capacity when the changes are made; bringing the attendance from 688 students right now, to approximately 834 in 2025;
- hoping to be approved by the Government for modular classrooms be moved from some high schools to other schools that will need them.
- 3. Questions
  - a) Will Edwards be getting any portables in the coming years to keep up with student numbers?
    - i. No, not anticipated.
  - b) How many grade 6 classes will Edwards have?
    - i. Not sure how many, but it's estimated that 6 more classes will be needed for grade 6.
  - c) Is RVS counting the students numbers for the new communities popping up?
    - i. Yes, the planning department are always looking at new communities when they decide on the changes.
  - d) Are these changes set in stone, even if the projected numbers changed quite drastically?
    - i. To change these plans, the majority of the RVS board would need to vote to want to put it to a new decision.
  - e) Do you have capacity projections for middle schools and high schools?
    - i. Yes, see all the information on the website (and link above)
  - f) How long would it take to have a portable moved from school to school?
    - The requests are placed in the fall, and we normally hear back from the Government in spring. RVS board is reiterating to the Government, the need for modular classrooms to be moved and shifted in the district.
  - g) Why make the high schools lower in capacity percentage than the middle and elementary schools?
    - i. Melissa is unsure of the reasoning, but she will go back to the board and find out.
