•	Structured literacy program being developed
	with support from Rocky View for next year in
	French and English.

•	School population: Current 675 students,
	projected increasing to about 840-875 next
	year.
•	May's PBIS focus on doing one's best;
	successful school concerts recently held for
	grades 3-5 reflected that.
•	Parent survey distributed to prepare school
	goals for next year; encouraged participation.
•	Jump Rope for Heart fundraiser raised over
	\$1,000, with an upcoming Jump Party planned.
•	Grade 6 options include leadership, robotics,
	jewelry, drama, digital and 3D design,
	photography; a 3D printer is being considered
	for purchase.
•	Updated school handbook available; feedback
	requested.
•	PBIS assessment score of 97%, planning to
	simplify expectations to three key behaviors:
	Kind, Respectful, Responsible. New school-
	wide PBIS School Matrix to launch in
	September.
•	June classroom activities include multiple field
	trips, Indigenous guests, and a school-wide

	<ul> <li>Diversity Day titled "Together We Are One" with cultural dress-up and more.</li> <li>Final assessments and report cards will be available on June 23 via PowerSchool.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>School facility updates: Tentative plans for no portables next year, main floor for K-3 and upper floor for grades 4-6, team teaching initiatives, and a transformation of the library into a student space with books redistributed.</li> <li>Additional assistant principal to be hired next year due to growth.</li> <li>Class size guidelines to be followed; expected larger class sizes at the higher end of guidelines (e.g., Kindergarten 19-24 students per class, Grade 4-6 up to 27-29).</li> <li>Attendance and literacy/numeracy statistics are positive.</li> </ul>
TRUSTEE'S REPORT Melyssa Bowen	<ul> <li>Modular classrooms update: Only 5 of 27 requested modulars allocated, with 4 proposed for Edwards and not rewarded. Additional modulars may or may not arrive later in the year.</li> <li>Capacity utilization is about 97%, with some schools going over 100%. Space is a major concern.</li> <li>Modular classrooms cannot be easily moved due to high cost requiring government funding.</li> <li>Budget highlights:         <ul> <li>Slight increase to \$344.5 million.</li> <li>Seven additional numeracy and literacy specialists added to bring total to 20 specialists across 53 schools, focusing</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
	on targeted support embedded within schools.

	<ul> <li>Smaller funding gap than previous years, yet still underfunded by approximately 140-150 students.</li> <li>Transportation fees increased by \$70 due to contract increases; half-price fee introduced for kindergarten students.</li> <li>Advocacy encouraged for increased funding and better support.</li> <li>Catchment area changes: New rural communities designated to other schools to balance enrollment.</li> </ul>
TREASURER'S REPORT	<ul> <li>Total funds available approximately \$9,705, including proceeds from spring family dance, Healthy Hunger lunches, and flower sales. More funds to be added.</li> <li>Motion passed to allocate: <ul> <li>\$2,000 towards the music program (from flower fundraiser).</li> <li>\$8,000 towards technology upgrades (chromebooks for younger grades).</li> </ul> </li> <li>Approved spending up to \$1,000 for the welcome back barbecue and \$200 for Boohoo coffee and tea for kindergarten families during staggered entry.</li> <li>STUDENT CARE UPDATE: Current balance: approximately \$1,605.82 with regular donations and expenses for supporting students' material needs. Donations accepted year round on School Cash Online.</li> <li>PACE UPDATE: Current funds: approximately \$22,663.23, with an outstanding check and approved expenses for library books and carpet replacements. Remaining budget for spending approximately \$6,161.20, with until November 2026 to spend casino funds.</li> </ul>
